

Options for Getting Textbooks in Alternative Format: Learning Ally

What is Learning Ally?

Learning Ally (<http://learningally.org>) is an organization that provides human-narrated audio versions of books, including some postsecondary textbooks, for students with qualifying disabilities. Anyone can search Learning Ally's book collection. Disability Services, however, will set up memberships as necessary and download books for registered students. Learning Ally books are in a format that requires specialized software or apps, which are available for free for Mac, PC, iOS, and Android devices.

Advantages:

- Some students prefer human narration to synthetic speech.
- Learning Ally's reading tools have navigational features, such as ability to jump to specific page numbers and add bookmarks.
- Speaking rate is adjustable.
- Some books offer both the text of the book and human speech (known as VOICEtext books).
- Learning Ally software/apps can be installed on multiple devices.
- If a book is available in Learning Ally's collection, Disability Services can easily add it to a student's "bookshelf" for timely access.

Disadvantages:

- Learning Ally's collection of postsecondary textbooks is growing, but not extensive.
